

### ■ PW Bake Sale


Our annual bake sale will be held in the Gathering Place before and after worship on Sunday, Dec. 22. Stop in and purchase homemade goodies baked by the

## *Member Profile: A Lifetime Spent at CHPC*

*In this "CHPC Member Profile," we talk with Berne and Betty Smith, whose family has a long history at our church.*

### **Q: When did you join CHPC and what brought you to this church?**

**Berne:** I was born in Syracuse, N.Y., to Spencer Bowman Smith and Wilhelmina LaBar Smith. My father was a Presbyterian minister. When I was 1, my family moved to Camp Hill for my father to become the third pastor of Camp Hill Presbyterian Church. He preached his first sermon on his 29th birthday at CHPC on Aug. 3, 1941.

When he came to CHPC, there were about 300 members in the church. I think I knew everyone except for about 50 people. Dad had an agreement with Welcome Wagon. When a family would purchase a home, my father would visit them and invite them to church. Our church congregation grew over the years to 1,700 members.

I think I am the longest living continuous member of CHPC at 78 years.

**Betty:** I was born in Grove City, Pa., to Ralph and Marion Weaver. My family moved to Dillsburg when I was 2 or 3. In 1949 we moved to Camp Hill. My

mother was Presbyterian and that was how we ended up at CHPC.

### **Q: Please tell us about your personal background and interests.**

**Berne:** I graduated from the College of Wooster in Ohio with a degree in history. I then continued my education at Duke University, receiving my law degree in 1965. I returned to Camp Hill and began practicing public utility law with the McNeese, Wallace, and Nurick Law Firm in Harrisburg. I retired in 1995 and started my own private practice in estate planning until full retirement in 2007.

Betty was working as a nurse on the 3 to 11 shift at Holy Spirit Hospital. My father would visit church members in the hospital during the hours that Betty was working there. Dad thought Betty was a very nice girl. My mother and Betty's mother started talking at Circle about us. Finally, I asked Betty to join me at a movie. We had our first date on Nov. 10, 1965, and we were married the following August.

**Betty:** I attended Harrisburg Polyclinic Hospital School of Nursing and graduated with an RN degree. I started working at Holy Spirit Hospital while continuing my education,

first at HACC and then finishing at Messiah College where I received my Bachelor of Science in nursing in 1968. I worked at Holy Spirit until we had our second son. I later returned to nursing, working for Hospice of Central PA, then as a case manager for Liberty Mutual and Everest Managed Care.

As for meeting Berne, I was a few years younger than him. We would see each other at school or church, but I didn't know him well. I would see his father when I was at work at Holy Spirit Hospital. One day, Berne called and asked me to the movies. I thought the date was OK. But our mothers would talk and my dad said to stop dating other guys because Berne is special.

We got married on August 27th of 1966. To this day, we still think, and laugh, that our marriage was an arranged marriage planned by our parents.

We have three sons: Stephen and wife, Rebecca; Michael and wife, Rebecca; and David and his wife, Nicky. They all live nearby. Stephen and his family are members of CHPC. We have eight grandchildren.

**Q: What activities were you involved in at CHPC?**

**Berne:** One of my first jobs was to sit up front in church. Dad knew ... people would fill in behind me rather than sit in the back.

As a young adult, I was a chaperone for the youth at Camp Michaux near Pine Grove Furnace. Camp Michaux was originally a Civilian Conservation Corps camp during the Great Depression. It became a secret POW camp during World War II for German and Japanese officers. After the war, (it) became a church camp for the United Presbyterian Church from 1946 to the 1970s.

I have been an elder and deacon. I worked with the Niners (a youth group just for the ninth graders). I helped with Joy and Sharing of Christmas. It involved crafts, a model train room, and many other activities. It was very well attended.

I have taught Sunday School and I continue to attend Men's Bible Study. I have been a welcomer on Sunday mornings, as well as participated in the choir.

**Betty:** I have been an elder. I was the president of the Presbyterian Women's Association. I was Circle chair.

I was a Sunday School

teacher to the 3-year-olds for many years. I remember one Sunday morning having 16 3-year-olds in my classroom with one child escaping and no one around to help me. It was busy.

I have been in choir for 38 years. I was involved with the Niners, I've cooked for Kirk Night, and I helped with Joy and Sharing of Christmas.

**Q: What hobbies do you have?**

**Berne:** I enjoy model railroading and watching movies on the Hallmark channel.

**Betty:** I collect Boyds Bears. I enjoy reading mysteries. I like to watch cooking shows, National Geographic Channel, and all shows dealing with animals.

**Q: What is a favorite memory at CHPC?**

**Berne:** Getting married. It was wonderful. The whole church was invited.

**Betty:** Getting married at CHPC.

**Q: Do you have any advice for younger members?**

**Berne:** Get involved. Church friends are special.


**Betty:** Make church a priority. Get your children involved. You can make a lot of good friends through church.

*Notes From the CHPC Treasurer*

■ CHPC receipts through Oct. 30 were \$454,862.18 and expenses were \$493,603.39, with expenses exceeding receipts year-to-date by \$38,741.21. If you are behind in paying your estimate of giving, please help CHPC by bringing your contributions up to date.

■ Offering envelopes are now available in the church office. These can be used

until we switch to our new fiscal year system in June.

■ We have spent \$137,587 on building renovations in 2019. The Endowment has loaned CHPC \$100,000 to help pay for these costs; this loan needs to be repaid by June 1. We have received several significant gifts in the last month, but we still need about \$55,000 to repay the loan.

■ Tax-efficient gifts can be made by doing a charitable IRA rollover if you are 70 1/2 older, by giving appreciated stock (and avoid paying tax on the capital gains), or by using a donor- advised fund.
