


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From the Pastor's Desk: A Farewell

Dr. Conklin comes to us from Limestone Presbyterian Church in Newark, Del., where she served as interim pastor since 2017. She received a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Trenton State College (now the College of New Jersey), a law degree from Seton Hall Law School, and a master's degree in divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. She has post-graduate training in family emotional systems from the Bowen Center for the Study of the Family at Georgetown.

Prior to ministry, she worked as a paralegal and then as a litigator in private practice. For a period during ministry, she worked part-time as a child advocate.

Nancy began her pastoral ministry as an associate pastor for youth and families in Connecticut. For the past 22 years, she has served as a pastor or as interim pastor in congregations throughout New Jersey.

Her spiritual journey began as a child of the church. She became actively involved in the Presbyterian Church at an early age. While in high school she taught Sunday School and Vacation

Bible School. After college, she was ordained an elder in her "home" church. When she was not practicing law, she was serving the church as a youth group leader and taught the confirmation class. It was through her service as a youth group leader that she began to experience her gifts for ministry. After a period of prayer and discernment of her call, Nancy entered seminary. Her faith formation was also greatly influenced by her witness of the work of the Salvation Army, as all of her maternal relatives, with the exception of her mother, have been ordained officers.

At the heart of her call to ministry, within and outside the walls of the church, is fostering spiritual growth from cradle to grave in the lives of people who hunger and thirst for deeper meaning and a greater purpose in their lives as children of God. She enjoys introducing people of all ages to a variety of spiritual disciplines as a means of experiencing the grace Christ desires for them. In all the congregations Dr. Conklin has served, she has created and led one-day and multi-day retreats for youth and adults. She believes that leading the congregation in

worship is a privilege. Through her preaching, Nancy invites people to hear their story in the larger biblical narrative of God's ongoing story of love, mercy, and grace. As the church was born at Pentecost as those gathered "heard the gospel in their own language," Nancy seeks to craft meaningful worship using a variety of liturgy, music, and artistic styles. She is told she is a gifted teacher, having taught both adults and youth for more than 30 years. A significant portion of her ministry has been extending pastoral care to persons of all ages.

As the youngest of three girls, Nancy grew up in central New Jersey. She found the best part of living in New Jersey was the beach. Her maternal grandparents retired to Asbury Park and her paternal grandparents to the mountains of Vermont, and so from an early age, she has loved spending time immersed in the beauty of creation. Nancy enjoys spending time with her family, especially with her niece and three godchildren as they grow into adulthood. She is blessed to have a rich constellation of friends with whom she

there is a bright future here, and this can be an exciting time for the church. Yes, some things may be done in a different way, and I trust that you will realize that many of those different ways of doing things will be for the purpose of living out the desires and goals expressed in the Mission Study.

I don't expect CHPC to become what it once was. In the same way, I know I can't become what I once was, or do the things I used to do. I have found it rather humiliating, for instance, to pick up a basketball and take some shots, because while I was never able to jump high, I did once have a jump shot. Not anymore. But, I think I understand the game a lot more and a lot better than I did when I was playing "back then." So CHPC may not become what it once was, but it can become more than it is right now, and the church can

grow deeper and stronger in its ministry. I encourage you to work with the Session and with the new pastor to help make that happen, and to celebrate together the way God is leading the church into the future.

When I realized that the PNC was getting close to calling a new pastor, I realized that I needed to figure out what my next opportunity might be. For a number of years Donna and I had thought we would retire to North Carolina, where we have some family and friends. But a couple of months ago I said to Donna, "It sounds like you would really prefer to move back to Florida." She said, "I guess I really would like that." So we began the process of writing the forms and looking at forms and interviewing, and things moved fast. I had a couple of interviews with churches who wanted to continue a conversation with me, but

they did not feel like they were the right fit for my gifts in ministry. Then I had a conversation with the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church in Sun City Center, Fla. Sun City Center is an over-55 community halfway between Tampa and Sarasota. So, we are moving to Florida near the end of October, and I will do interim ministry there beginning early in November, and when that interim ministry is completed I will retire and already be in our retirement home. We are still amazed at how that all worked out!

We certainly take good thoughts and good memories with us as we leave this area and move "back home" to Florida. May God's peace be with all of you and with Camp Hill Presbyterian Church!

Member Profile: Q&A With Ann Markley

This month, we are starting a new feature organized by our Fellowship and Membership Ministry. "Member Profile" will tell the stories of longtime CHPC members using a question-and-answer format. Our first spotlight is on Ann Markley, who has been a CHPC member for nearly 50 years.

Q: What brought you to CHPC?

A: My grandfather was the director of the Boyd Memorial Building at Pine Street in the 1940s and I was a third-generation member at Pine Street Presbyterian, with my mother as a Sunday School teacher and my father an elder and superintendent of the Sunday School.

During my youth, I also had ties with CHPC. Because I had 10 years of perfect Sunday School attendance at Pine Street, my way was paid to go to Camp Michaux, and CHPC pastor Spencer Smith was the director. Willie Smith was my counselor and Berne Smith and I were fellow campers for many years.

After Don and I got married and had children, we were living on 17th Street in Camp Hill just blocks from CHPC. I wanted our children to be able to participate in weekday activities at church as I had

done. We had only one car and getting to Pine Street with four young children involved way too much organization and juggling of one car. Since I also had ties with CHPC, that decision was easy. We joined CHPC about 1970.

Q: What activities were you involved in at CHPC?

A: I was moderator of deacons, elder for two terms, stewardship chairman, and our family had a booth at Joy of Sharing (we were dipping candles in our colonial outfits). I was also Kirk Night director, at the request of Dr. Milligan, along with Berne Smith and Jim Walker who served as table leaders every Wednesday evening.

Don and I were sponsors for our Moldovian family, along with Shirley and Jim Walker (a CHPC associate pastor).

I was chairman of two of our church directories. I have been a confirmand adviser and the Nominating Committee chairman for Presbyterian Women.

My husband, Don, passed away in 2016. He served as an elder and a faithful worker with the WORMS (Working Order of Retired Men). They'd work in the morning doing carpentry,

plumbing, and other jobs around the church, then head to the West Shore Plaza Diner for lunch on Tuesdays.

My claim to CHPC fame is that I was the assisting elder at the baptism of the Rev. Anne Stewart when she was a baby.

Q: What hobbies do you have?

A. I'm a member of the 120-member Penn Cumberland Garden Club and former president. I am a Penn State master gardener. I raise Monarch butterflies from eggs that I collect from milkweed plants. In the wild, fewer than 10 percent of eggs reach the adult stage. Raising in a protected environment greatly increases the odds. Last year, I raised and released 97 Monarch butterflies.

I constructed a 48-inch diameter labyrinth in the style of the Chartres Labyrinth in France. It is on a 7-acre property 10 miles east of the state capital, where I grew up and which we have had for 75 years. All are welcome to visit it anytime. Bring a friend and a sandwich, and relax and enjoy the birds, gardens, and frogs. I was inspired to build

Volunteers Spend Amazing Week at MATE

The week of July 20 to 27 was a most blessed week in the lives of the 46 members of the mission team from CHPC and First Presbyterian Church of Ramsey, N.J., at Mission at the Eastward in western Maine.

We traveled to New England on the hottest day of the summer, enjoying a cookout at the southern Maine lakefront home of First Presbyterian's Robator family. By Sunday afternoon, the weather had changed into perfect Maine summer weather for the rest of our week.

Our group was divided into five work crews, plus the kitchen team. Crews completed nine projects, which included building handicapped-accessible ramps and decks; installing a new floor and a storm door; and replacing a window and several shingle and metal roofs. The kitchen crew kept the entire team well-fed.

The real mission of our MATE team, however, was to share the love of Christ with the families we served, as well as one another. As one team member said, "I have spent the week in amazing fellowship with a team that seemed guided by God for the ease in which

we instantly fell into a rhythm of work, support, laughter, and comradery. The fact that I was shingling a roof was only icing on the MATE cake!"

If you were in church on the Sunday of our return, you heard the wonderful story of 14-year-old Deacon, as shared by Sandy McBride.

Deacon's mother has a debilitating progressive disease. His father was killed in Afghanistan. Deacon is on the autism spectrum. At first, he was withdrawn, but the team members were able to engage him. By the second day on the site, he was working alongside the crew. He was presented with a Bible, and the crew invited him to our evening trip to the Wire Bridge.

Deacon's mom told a crew leader that he would usually sleep until noon every day, but he so loved working with the crew that he would

arise at 6:30 a.m. to be ready for their 8 a.m. arrival. The crew was pleased to present her with a prayer shawl made by our Quilters and Crafters for Mission. Our MATE week working at Deacon's home was the highlight of his summer — and ours!

This was just one story of many from MATE. Pam Thompson led our daily devotions, which were based on the Beatitudes. At MATE, we each discovered how blessed we are!

Thank you to the CHPC family for your prayers and financial support. Thank you to Quilters and Crafters for the prayer shawls — each family received one.
